



2019 IEB MATRIC RESULTS

Each year our Matric girls do themselves and us proud, and this year is no exception. The girls have, in every instance, improved their averages from Trials and achieved results of which they can be proud. We congratulate our girls on this remarkable achievement. Here are some of the Matric's achievements:

- 67 candidates wrote and achieved 100 % Bachelor Passes.
- 144 subject Level 7 symbols (80% or more). This is 30.5% of the total symbols.
- 166 subject Level 6 symbols (70 – 79 %). 65.7% of all symbols were 70% or higher.
- This means there were on average 2.1 distinctions per candidate and 4.6 level 6 or 7 passes per candidate.

Our Top Achiever for 2019 was Sarah Burnett who achieved 7 distinctions, plus 79% in Advanced Programme Mathematics and an aggregate of 89.83%. She achieved in the top 5% of candidates in 6 subjects and earned a place on the IEB's Outstanding Achievement list with 73 other top performers from around the country. In addition to this, Sarah achieved in the Top 1% of Candidates in Mathematics. We congratulate Sarah on this outstanding achievement.

In total 9 girls achieved A aggregates (over 80% average in all subjects). 34 candidates achieved B aggregates (70 – 79%). This means that 65.7% of girls achieved A or B aggregates. The average aggregate was 72.3%.
