Congratulations to our awesome "Yellow Feet" for participating in the 96th Comrades Marathon on Sunday, 11 June with such BIG heart.


From our incredible staff to SJS family members and those running for the St John's D.S.G. Athletics Club - we are proud of you all!

# Gentle Parenting by Mrs Michelle Gevers

### **FATHERS**

Last Sunday we celebrated Father's Day, a day created by society for giving thanks and honoring our fathers. I am also so mindful and sensitive to the fact that we have a generation of fatherless children with deep 'father wounds." Amidst this hurt and confusion, how do we honour the role of a father and how do fathers honour their children? Our greatest example is our Heavenly Father as He encompasses compassion, forgiveness, mercy and solidifies this with truth.

I recall several years ago working in the Jika Joe settlement with young 9 /10-year old's trying to survive in an adult world with no father. Today three of those young men are currently in their second year studying at UCT. They weren't removed from their community but rather had a spiritual father speak into their lives. He taught them the goodness of God and to turn their hearts to God and seek Him in all that they do, irrespective of their circumstances.

Fathers, physical or spiritual, have a responsibility to honour children. They are to care for them and their well being and treat them as God treats us, with love, care and compassion on an emotional, physical, intellectual and spiritual level. There are fathers today that are deeply affected by their upbringing, a neglectful, abusive, addictive, controlling or non-involved father, which too bears repercussions on our adult life. Healing and forgiveness in the name of Jesus is what gets us through and restores us to a wholesome being, a complete vessel that can receive and give love with no conditions attached.

The societal pressures on fathers, and men in general, are enormous, as a large portion of this is found in materialism and status. A society that demands the 'best of' appears to be the measurement of success. Fathers, be kind and honest with yourself and make wise choices. Assess the true needs of your family. Spending time connecting on a deeper level creates intimate relationships, which further creates a sense of belonging in your children, which encourages them to look inward as opposed to measuring up to other families.

May you enjoy this upcoming holiday, using the time to build meaningful and honest relationships. May it be a pleasurable time together and may you be well rested for the start of Term 3.

### Robotics in the Junior School

Robotics was first introduced into our Junior School six years ago, and has become an exciting and valuable part of the curriculum that we offer our girls. Our guiding focus in our Educational Technology learning and teaching remains, as always, our core values. We will have failed our girls if they become "hooked" on technology with no ethical understanding of its implementation or skills to use it to solve real-world problems. Technology can and should be used for good!



### What is Robotics?

Educational robotics is a discipline designed to introduce children to robotics and programming interactively from a young age. "Robotics" is a branch of engineering that involves the conception, design, manufacture, and operation of robots - think of robots or machines we can control to perform tasks for us in our daily lives. Robots consist of sensors and processing units that help them perceive their environment, and motors whichhelp them to move their limbs or wheels.

### Why should children learn Robotics?

There are MANY reasons why children should learn robotics. Here are our top five:

- Futuristic Skills: Our children need to be prepared for jobs that do not even exist yet. They NEED to be technologically literate learning to code, interact with artificial intelligence, and automation.
- Creativity and Innovation: Robots excite children and pull them into creative processes such as brainstorming, designing, testing, evaluating and innovating.
- ➤ Computational Thinking Skills: Robotics combines the learning of critical computational thinking skills, which are important in teaching children how to leverage technology to solve real-world problems and think critically about them. These skills are abstraction, algorithmic thinking, decomposition, iteration, debugging and generalization.
- Facilitates STEM Learning: Science, technology, engineering and mathematical skills are employed with a focus on hands-on learning and real-world application.
- Social Benefits: There are loads of social benefits when children learn robotics. They learn to work as a team, be patient, persist when solving problems, how to fail, and how to compromise.

### How is Robotics taught at St John's D.S.G.?

In Grades R and 1, our girls are introduced to skills they will need in an "unplugged" (meaning concrete learning without a screen) way. We have just excitingly purchased Sphero Indi robots, which we will introduce to these grades soon. From Grades 2 and up, our girls begin robotics during their weekly Educational Technology lessons. Our robotics curriculum follows the world-standard LEGO Education, exposing our learners to top tier robotics education. The curriculum takes our learners through various projects, each with a real-world problem to explore and solve through robotics. Each project also aims to teach our girls targeted, specific technical skills.

Last year some of our robotics club girls made St John's D.S.G. history as they competed in the World Robot Olympiad for the first time! Our Senior School girls are extended even further in Grades 8 and 9 with Mrs Lisa Akerman and Mrs Ingrid Evans. With this firm foundation, our girls have the grounding to go on to continue their coding and robotics journeys in their Senior Schools and beyond.
