Do We Need to Teach Kindness?

We certainly started our term with a fresh and cold start! God created all seasons for a purpose. Winter is typically a season of dormancy, pruning and feeding a root system in the plant kingdom, perhaps we should use this as an example in our lives. As parents, this is a perfect season to feed into our lives as well as our children's. We can use the darker evenings of being indoors as an opportunity to spend more time connecting, a time to listen and seize opportunities to teach them ownership.

I have recently spent time facilitating EQ workshops with our Grade 8 and 9 boarders. A popular current behavioral trend that is on the rise is "ghosting". We have been looking at the causes and the behavioral patterns that exhibit themselves. This is not a new term, it originated after WW2 but has been adopted in this digital era even more-so. Ghosting is defined as, "suddenly ending all communication and avoiding contact with another person without apparent warning or explanation and ignoring attempts to communicate." This has been a challenging exercise because ghosting has been normalized in society, we see this in both the Junior and Senior Schools. This behaviour is saying more about the "ghoster" than those receiving this behaviour. Ghosting speaks of the lack of courage to identify and deal with the issue. It is a lack of self-awareness, accountability and ownership. It is born in a place of insecurity and fear.

Rev. Di recently addressed this from an emotional health perspective and quoted Peter Scazzero (Psychologist, Author) and our shadow self, which feeds into to our theme for the term - OWNERSHIP. What is it that we need to face in our lives? What do we keep hidden from others? If these go unanswered and unresolved, we fall into the trap of reacting and putting up defense mechanisms. When we are honest with ourselves and look deeply into our shadow self, we can take ownership of it and we can allow Jesus into that space, to heal and restore. We cannot disciple to others if we ourselves do not possess it, so this is where our authenticity is paramount. Teaching ownership is a drip philosophy, it needs to be ongoing.

When we become aware of this, the next step is to own it. From there, I ask myself, "Why?" Why did I feel that way and why did I respond as I did? We should not allow ourselves to remain in the emotional state of this, but rather once we own it, we should be able to apply logic and then ultimately our behaviour should change. However, if I do not take ownership, this response becomes a pattern and perpetuates itself and no learning or growth can take place, as energy is used to justify behaviour as opposed to correcting it. This process is not a quick fix, that is why our parenting role is an incredible gift, an opportunity to mould and influence a beautiful young life into a wholesome young adult.

As parents we need to seek out "teachable moments", don't let them pass but rather speak and train the next generation to be a generation of truth. It is challenging, but the benefit is well worth the effort.

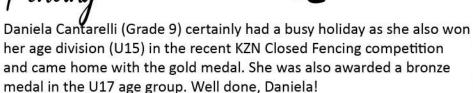
