JUNIOR SCHOOL NEWS Gentle Parenting by Michelle Gevers

"Everything is meaningless, completely meaningless!", words written in 935 B.C. by Solomon recorded in the book of Ecclesiastes. Solomon finds himself questioning the purpose of life, a life that has been good, a life full of intellect, power, wealth and abundance in all things. He has an honest approach (ties in with our theme of ownership) as he takes stock of accumulating material things and likens this all to, "chasing the wind."

As parents, do we ever find ourselves asking the same questions? Solomon asks himself because he had forgotten his purpose and pursued his own desires. As parents, our role to parent should be purpose driven. So, what is this purpose and how do we go about this in our daily workplaces, marriages, home and parenting?

We need to be reminded that there is no child conceived without God's knowledge (Ps139). He repeats the statement after each of His creation, "It is good." He is specific about this purpose. He created us for His glory (Isa 43:7) and he instructs us to do, "everything for the glory of God" (1Cor 10:31). Therefore, we need to reflect God's character in our parenting. This means we need to teach His truth into our children's lives. Their identity should be found in Him, not things of the world. This is our first responsibility, by doing this we will raise a generation who won't be gullible to pseudo-science, but instead recognizing God is our Creator. Then, we mimic His character. He is just and loving. This translates into being fair and not unreasonable, it means being a good listener, not condemning but correcting, not punishing but discipling. We need to be the living example that our children want to mimic not social media influencers. This applies to your family values, speak these aloud so your children know what your family believes in and holds onto. Let them match the behaviour to the words spoken, this develops emotional intelligence when these are aligned together with their emotions.

We should seek to be honest at all times and speak in love, this allows consequences to be addressed and not "brushed under the carpet". This is common in today's society as our mental and emotional tanks can be depleted quickly and the effort seems too much. Remain consistent. By being consistently fair establishes healthy emotional boundaries as our children know what to expect, this establishes a firm foundation for them.

Be present, life is fleeting! Make the time to show up and watch practices, recitals, assemblies, cook and share meals together, read bedtime stories, laugh and play together. Our children need to feel our presence, they need a constant reminder of our love for them. God reminds us constantly of His great love for us, as His creation surrounds us every day.


Marimbas to the Max
